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Board Matters

IAF Chair's Report July 2022 - June 2023



The year July 2022 - June 2023 has been an eventful year for the IAF. It began with a decision by the then Board to wind up the IAF due to declining membership numbers, an uncertain economic situation, and having no replacement to take over as Chair after John Holmes concluded his six-year, two-term stint in that role. The announcement at last year's AGM in November came as a shock to many and a decision was made by the Board in December to postpone for three months in an effort to find a new Chair and to manage the wind down.

In February and March 2023, with the firm belief that the IAF had the potential to be reinvigorated and to continue its work in fundraising to support South Australian artists, my husband and I submitted proposals to the Board for ways to do this and offered our assistance. These included adopting new fundraising strategies by planning occasional, larger-scale events with a wider range of events to attract broader audiences and boost income generation; developing and implementing a multi- stranded marketing plan that would raise the profile of the IAF amongst artists and the public and boost audiences and income; identifying one or more new venues with acoustics and a sound system, better suited to our needs and able to accommodate larger audiences; and undertaking an active and targeted search strategy for new Board members - including a Chair - with specific skill sets and professional expertise that would contribute to increasing the profile and marketing reach of the IAF.

In March 2023, with the Board still having no Chair and time running out, I volunteered to take on the role of Interim Chair, a proposal that was accepted by the Board. A few weeks later, the Board agreed to rescind the decision to wind up the IAF and we have been busy in many ways since then with work on new fundraising events and planning and policy documents.

The focus on larger events was adopted by the Board and we identified and have been using the Osmond Terrace Function Centre, Norwood for the literary dinners as well as for other, larger, fundraising events. During May and June planning began for three major events: a musical event with the Keith Conlon Trio in July, a cabaret in September and a literary luncheon with guest speaker Pip Williams in October. Helen Onopko approached Pip Williams, and she and Jill Argent began planning that event, whilst Laurence Nobes, a cabaret artist and event organiser, was approached to help with the organisation of the cabaret, a role that he adopted as a volunteer. The facilities of the Function Centre that the venue offers have enabled us to accommodate larger audiences for these events, with between 80 and 145 for each.

The Board will continue to explore opportunities for increasing future revenue generation with a program of events that reaches out to the public through more diverse – but targeted – range of events - with the prospect of increased revenue for grants, and better outcome in terms of time and energy of all the volunteers involved.

During the period 1 July 2022 - 30 June 2023, the Board membership has had some changes. Carol Maelzer joined the Board at the last AGM, and since then has taken on several tasks including assisting Mary Odlum with the organisation of film nights, acquiring and preparing raffles prizes and selling tickets; Carol organised the completion of the December IAF Newsletter and also introduced and compiled a booklet of reports received from past grant recipients. This report, distributed earlier this year, provides a useful record of the outcomes for grantees and is a powerful illustration of the value of our fundraising work.

Early in the year, Jen and Chloe Dunstan both stood down due to Jen's health and to focus on her post-operative recuperation. Both have given several years work to the Board and had been key figures at regular IAF events as well as initiating some memorable one-off events. We have been delighted to see Jen's progress in her health journey and her attendance at the AGM.

The strategic search for new Board members undertaken between February and April 2023, has reaped rewards. IAF member Tracy Crisp, herself a performing artist, expressed her interest in joining the Board. She was formally co-opted onto the Board in May and since then she has provided valuable insights into artists' experiences and perspectives and made suggestions for policy changes which are under discussion.

Josh White was one of the individuals identified in our search for skilled professionals and we are delighted that he also joined the Board. Josh is CEO of Neon Treehouse, a digital marketing agency, and has a wealth of experience in marketing and management. Josh was formally co-opted onto the Board in May and immediately reviewed and revised the draft Marketing Strategy, presenting a draft document with the addition of several proposals that are under consideration by the Board. He is helping us to utilise online strategies and advising on various ways of building networks across the arts sector that will improve the IAF's presence, profile and reach.

Since they joined the Board, Josh and Tracy have been working with Margaret Lynch to develop a Strategic Plan for the IAF. This is critical to the formation of various policies and plans that the IAF needs to adopt to ensure that we operate according to good governance principals in everything that we do, and that we increase efficiency and productivity, build audiences, diversify activities, boost income and extend our reach within the arts sector. The plan will be completed early 2024.

We have gained another co-opted member of the Board, Merinda Edwards but, as her introduction falls outside the timescale of this report, I will leave discussion of her role and contributions until a later date.

So, the financial year ended in June with a much-improved outlook for the IAF, lots of activity being undertaken by Board members and the prospect of several exciting new fundraising events to look forward to.

I would like to thank all the members of the Board for their hard work, their energy and commitment to the arts and the work of the IAF, and also thank members and donors for their support as attendees of the events, for helping to spread the word amongst family and friends, and for the financial input through donations, ticket purchase, not to mention our regular raffles.

Due to the limitations on terms in office as members of the Board, as determined by the IAF Constitution, three of our Board members have reached – or gone beyond – that limit: Cheryl Appelkamp de Valenzuela who has organised the literary dinners for many years; Mary Odlum, Treasurer; and Helen Onopko, Secretary and archivist. I would like to acknowledge the tremendous input that they have had in many ways and the huge amount of knowledge that they have of the IAF and its activities over the years. We will welcome their continued active involvement in supporting the IAF and the events program as well as Helen's ongoing volunteering work as the IAF archivist.

The Treasurer is a key role and the Constitution does make provision for Mary to continue in this role as a Board member, if there is no-one else appointed, and the role of secretary is also essential. Both Mary and Helen would welcome a rest and handing over the reins to others. So, we welcome nomination or volunteers for these two positions and will be dealing with the voting of Board members during the course of this evening's meeting.

As always, we would also welcome help from anyone who would like to volunteer to assist with planning and presenting future events as well as supporting the work of the Board in other ways. There are various roles that can be undertaken, so please approach any of the Board members over the course of the evening, or afterwards by email, if you would be able to assist in any way.

Treasurer's Report

The IAF is registered as a charity with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) which allows us to receive tax deductible donations.

A full financial report was presented at the AGM held on 21 November 2023.

The IAF revenue comes from members and friends attending fundraising events, supporting the raffles,

paying membership fees and making donations. All funds raised go towards supporting emerging artists. We thank all of you that support us.

In the financial year 2022-2023, the IAF gave \$18,750 in small grants, sponsorships, and awards. Of this:

- \$14,750 was awarded in Small Grant awards, five to individual artists and two group awards.
- \$2,000 sponsorship was provided to the Holden Street Theatre Fringe Artists' Program.
- \$1,000 (2 awards of \$500) for the Young Film Maker Award at the Fleurieu Film Festival.

Our membership numbers are now around 160 and we thank those of you that continue to renew your membership. An increase to membership fees was approved at the AGM.

From 1 January 2024, annual membership fees will be:

- \$40 Single Membership (12 months)
- \$75 Double Membership (12 months)

Film nights were held regularly at Wallis Cinemas, Mitcham from March to November 2023 and Literary dinners were held from April to November 2023 at The Osmond Terrace Function Centre, The Norwood Hotel.

In addition, four very successful special fundraising events were held between July and December 2023, three at the Osmond Terrace Function Centre and the End of Year Celebration at The Regal Theatre and Marryatville Hotel.

Neil Curnow Award Recipient 2024 - Ren Williams

The Neil Curnow Award is made possible through the generous bequest of the late Neil Curnow. Following his impressive career as an actor, director, teacher and voice coach, Neil made a bequest through the IAF to support emerging South Australian theatre people through this prestigious award.



The Neil Curnow Award is available to final-year students and graduates aged between 18 and 30. The purpose of the award is to support an emerging artist to undertake further study or career development in acting, theatre performance or theatre direction.

The award supports the recipient to undertake further study or an internship at a recognised institution, nationally or internationally.

The 2024 Neil Curnow Award recipient is Flinders University Graduate, Ren Williams.

Ren is an actor, writer, director, and co-founder of independent theatre company CRAM Collective.

After graduating in 2020, Ren made her directing debut with Deadset Theatre Company's show *Truck Stop* along with winning State Theatre Company South Australia's Young Playwright Award for her play *Modified*. After forming CRAM in 2021, Ren performed in and produced their world premiere of *Something Big* following the sold-out *New World Coming*, a show created in five days. In 2022 Ren performed in STCSA's StateSide show *Kill Climate Deniers* as five different characters. Most recently, Ren performed in the DreamBIG Festival in the one-woman show *Guthrak* before puppeteering on the set of *Beep and Mort* for Season 2 and joining the USA tour of *Bluey's Big Play* at the end of 2023.

In 2024 Ren will travel to London to undertake a four-week intensive screen acting course with the Actors Studio. This will be followed by a week-long intensive at the International School of Screen Acting with tutoring by renowned industry professionals, including Sue Dunderdale, Ben Cogan, Jane Ahmore, and Leon Lopez.

On receiving the news of her successful application, Ren said she was, "over the moon". "Being given the opportunity to undertake a world-renowned masterclass in screen acting will not only enhance my artistic development as an actor, but it will further my career within the film industry and allow me to bring this knowledge back to Kaurna Yerta. I am so excited and incredibly grateful to Helpmann for this career-changing experience," said Ren.


All three events were held in the Osmond Terrace Function Centre, Norwood.

The Independent Arts Foundation was thrilled to host Pip Williams and Sandy Verschoor at our literary event on Sunday, 1 October 2023, and very much appreciated the time Pip gave us amid her busy schedule.



Pip has become the go-to author across book clubs here and overseas, and we were very happy to have secured her for our event. Sandy Verschoor many of you will be familiar with as our former Lord Mayor of Adelaide until 2022. Sandy also has a deep involvement in the Arts industry in South Australia directing or producing the Festival of

Arts, the Adelaide Fringe, the Festival of Ideas and the Windmill Theatre to name a few.

In a "Writer's Week" style, Sandy interviewed Pip on the stage at the Norwood Function Centre, seamlessly moving between Pip's travel memoir "One Summer in Italy", her next publication "The Dictionary of Lost Words", and more recently "The Bookbinder of Jericho".

Pip wowed the 107 people in the audience with her grace, eloquence and wonderful company. With particular relevance to the characters in the two novels, she expressed the need in this current world for recognizing the needs of humanity and the significance of work undertaken by women in history.

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Literary Dinner Report

Looking back over our 2023 literary dinners, I am reminded of what a wonderful range of books Wakefield Press publishes and how lucky we are to have access to their authors, thanks to their sponsorship and the presence of its publisher Michael Bollen at most of our dinners.

We commenced the 2023 series on Wednesday, 12 April in our new venue, the Osmond Terrace Function Centre of Norwood Hotel, with Abraham Maddison as guest speaker. His heartfelt talk about

his autobiography, *Crazy Bastard*, on the subject of his own forced adoption, was very moving and provoked a lot of comments from guests.

We resumed holding the dinners on the third Tuesday of the month from 16 May, with Mike Ladd, well-known to ABC listeners through his program Poetica, talking about his book, *Dream Tetras*, in which Mike's dream-inspired essays are accompanied by illustrations produced by his partner, Cathy Brooks.

Our guest speaker on 20 June was Heather Taylor-Johnson, an American-Australian who was so upset by the result of the 2016 American presidential election that she expressed her outrage and disbelief in a series of poems which were published as *Alternative Hollywood Ending*.

Roanna McClelland, a former South Australian now living and working in Melbourne, whose background includes environmental policy and law, was an inspiring guest speaker on 18 July, talking about her book, *The Comforting Weight of Water*.

On 15 August, Martin Hamilton-Smith, who has the unusual distinction of having served as a Leader of the SA Liberal Party and Leader of the Opposition and subsequently as a cabinet minister in a Labor government, was guest speaker to talk about his book, *Seven Leaders in Camelot*, which outlines the major political events that took place under seven different leaders over thirty years in South Australia.

Our guest speaker on 19 September was Hilton Koppe, a former NSW country GP who was forced to give up general practice due to PTSD and who wrote about his experiences in an insightful book, *One Curious Doctor*. We didn't hold a literary dinner in October due to a major literary event which was held on Sunday, 1 October with Pip Williams in conversation Sandy Verschoor.

From the Archive

IAF is forever grateful to past members who have generously provided reminiscences and documents relating to the earlier days of the Elizabethan Theatre Trust as it morphed into the Independent Arts Foundation.

Nora Miliken added much value to our story with documents and photographs. She regaled through a letter to 'Bill' - a colleague overseas at the time - a series of three events concerned with the Playwrights Competition which was conducted every two years to coincide with the Adelaide Festival.

Many thanks once again for this entertaining story Nora....

"The Playwrights Competition was held every two years to coincide with the Adelaide Festival. This particular year (mid 1980s) we received 97 entries from all over Australia, and the judges were very impressed with the high standard. The awards were announced and presented during Writers Week by John Bannon in the presence of august and prominent citizens, and afterwards we served drinks and exquisite savouries on the lawns around the Writers tent. As you can imagine, it was difficult to exclude gate-crashers and consequently quite a few interestingly loutish citizens who were neither august nor-prominent came lurching in, lured by the chilled white wine nestling in ice —that day it was 100 degrees!

I was put in charge of the drink for all three functions, but that one was the most difficult. I had to get a special permit so that a delivery van could enter the sacred ground of the Torrens Parade Ground, drive across it, and deliver the goods, but it all worked beautifully, and I am now regarded as an expert at getting drink delivered in awkward places.

The second function was a cocktail party at which we entertained artists appearing during the Festival. But the third was our piece de resistance! The Trust gave us \$5000 to workshop



the winning play. The Stage Company, under the direction of John Noble were engaged to carry out the workshop, and the Playwrights Committee decided to do something stylish. The day was master-minded by Jessica Dames.

We decided to hire a train to take us to Mt Lofty where we were greeted by a brass band, then buses took everyone to Eurilla (the home of Kym and Julie Bonython) where a beautifully decorated marquee housed the play workshop, followed by a magnificent buffet served on the lawns, then back on the buses to the train and return to Adelaide.

As you can imagine, the organisation was complicated: 310 people were coming on the train, with another 90 driving themselves. The train had to be decorated, we served champagne and crayfish sandwiches on the way up, and port, cheese and meringues on the way back. I had to get to the station early on the Sunday morning to get the champagne, glasses, and food into each carriage.

The whole operation went so smoothly it was all worth the effort. The weather wasn't particularly good, in fact it was bloody awful – rain and cold – but the hardship coupled with the abundance of wine seemed to bring people together and everyone had a marvellous time."
