REPORTS FROM EMERGING ARTISTS CHELSEA EVANS

"In September 2015 I was fortunate enough to receive support from the Independent Arts Foundation to help fund the premier of my first solo work, SHOWGA. SHOWGA is a one-woman show that satirizes the Health and Wellness industry. I premiered SHOWGA for the Melbourne Fringe Festival in the renowned venue The Butterfly Club to rave reviews and wonderful audience reactions.

I created SHOWGA under a one-month artistic residency with The Mill Adelaide in association with the Helpmann Academy. During the residency I used structured improvisations to generate the physical and text based material and I received mentorship from Israel Aloni; the director of Swedish Dance Theatre company ilDance.

SHOWGA is interactive work where audiences are instructed through a five step plan to "learn how to love themselves". In the work I employ text, movement and comedy to tell the story of an eccentric modern day failing Yoga Guru. Adelaide artists Ben Roberts and Olivia Freear are also on the SHOWGA team; Roberts as producer and Freear as costume designer and maker.



With the funding I received from the Independent Arts Foundation I was able to fine-tune the work with two weeks of rehearsals. I was also once again able to work with my mentor from the Mill Residency, Israel Aloni, who traveled to Australia from Sweden to continue the mentorship.

Additionally I was able to print flyers and posters to promote the show and boost audience numbers; all of which I am immensely grateful for.



Whilst alone in the rehearsal process, a challenge I faced was to be inside and outside of the work at the same time (as this is my first solo work I had never experienced this so greatly). I had to be with the characters inner workings

whilst rehearsing and also keep an awareness of what I was going from an outside point of view, as I did not have a director. When the time came for my mentor to join me I was able to let go of some off this outside awareness so I could fully invest in the performance. I am very grateful to have worked with Aloni once again and for him to have pushed me artistically. He is now not only a mentor but also a friend and I look forward to working with him again in the future.

During the Fringe season we played to vibrant and energetic audiences. There was a real sense of community with the artists at The Butterfly Club and I formed friendships with Artists from all over Australia. We received rave reviews from the media and had wonderful audience reactions. I am proud of the work and am very grateful to Independent Arts Foundation for supporting the production."

JOANNE HARTSONE wrote this following thank you note to members:

"In 2013, I received a grant of \$1000 from the IAF to assist with my travel to the Edinburgh Fringe Festival, where I worked as a Company Manager and Producer for two independent companies from Croatia and Los Angles.



Whilst there, I had the opportunity to network and plan with other theatre producers, writers, directors and performers for future tours and productions. I have subsequently produced and managed productions from London, Kansas, Belfast, and Tbilisi (Georgia) in the Edinburgh Fringe, as well as engaging with South Australian theatre practitioners to create new local productions, that are currently in development for Australia-wide touring. Other opportunities have emerged from this initial trip, both locally and internationally.

I will be travelling to New York in two weeks to produce a new comedy off-Broadway at Theater for the New City. I have also been able to bring some of the best theatre productions from the Edinburgh Fringe to Adelaide, including the Best Theatre Award winner 'The Bunker Trilogy' in 2014, which is returning for a hugely anticipated return in 2016.

I have curated for the 2016 Adelaide Fringe a 12-production season at the Queens Theatre with some of the best productions from the UK, the USA, NSW, VIC and SA. I will also be bringing a

new solo-show from New York to the 2016 Adelaide Fringe, and have coerced Guy Masterson – my friend and mentor – to give two performances in the middle of the festival.

The grant I received in 2013 has opened many doors for me, and helped me contribute to the South Australian arts scene in a professional and creative way.

ADELAIDE CRITICS CIRCLE AWARDS

The annual Adelaide Critics Circle Awards were held in the University of Adelaide's Little Theatre in December 2015. The evening's compere was Peter Burdon, Chair of the Adelaide Critics Circle.

IAF sponsors the Innovation in the Arts Award which went to the **Zephyr Quartet** for their concert *Music for Strings and iTh*ings, a demonstration of Zephyr's dedication to collaborative practice embracing music, composition, lighting design, animation, gaming and downright geekery. With smartphones left on during the concert, the audience genuinely became part of the performance themselves.

ADELAIDE'S fifteen-year old Zephyr Quartet is renowned for its exploration of diverse music, expanding musical boundaries and introducing audiences to courageous new works. Their concert continued their cutting edge approach with six different Australian compositions, all utilising electronic and visual technologies in addition to the string quartet. Two works took audience participation to a new 21st century level, asking audience members to download prerecorded tracks from Sound Cloud to their mobile phones to play back at full volume, on cue, as part of the performance accompanying the quartet.

Zephyr's cellist Hilary Kleinig composed For Those Who've Come Across The Seas using Australia's treatment of 'boat people' as her impetus. Back projections of swirling ocean waters accompanied the music using fragments from traditional masses, the national anthem, and the SOS morse code signal. It was strongly emotional combining almost folkloric elements with a pining spirituality, and when the phone tracks swelled from amongst the audience the effect was quite magical. (The Advertiser).

IAF GRANTS

In the period July to December 2015, IAF has supported-

Young Adelaide Voices (YAV) with a \$500 contribution towards their European Tour. The tour will involve 37 of the YAV First Concert Choir who are aged between 12 and 20, plus supporters and of course Christie Anderson, YAV's Artistic Director. The choir will visit 3 major destinations in Europe over a month from June next year and will take part in festivals, competitions and friendship concerts as well as cultural excursions and sightseeing.

The IAF and YAV hope to arrange a joint project in 2016 to which members will be invited to come and hear their beautiful and artistic singing.

Mid North Coast Strings Alliance Inc (MCNSA) with a \$1000 grant to support two South Australian musicians tutor the young musicians at their annual summer music camp held in January 2016.

Bookings at Bass

Philip writes **Deluge** began in 2013 as part

of an Australia Council mentorship between myself and playwright Andrew Bovell.

I set out to create a large work in partnership with STCSA Resident Director Nescha Jelk and ten then third-year actors at Flinders University Drama Centre. We spent a total of six weeks over 2013 and 2014 exploring the notion that we live our lives so inundated with information that it threatens to overwhelm us. *Deluge* is structured as five separate plays that ran simultaneously in the same space, with the audience's focus torn between each. We have been lucky enough to be programmed in the Adelaide Festival of Arts 2016.

Nescha and I have formed a company for our creative partnership, Tiny Bricks, and *Deluge* is being presented in partnership with Brink Productions. Being programmed in the Festival is a huge coup for this group of young and emerging artists, but as an umbrella show we are still responsible for raising the vast majority of the funds ourselves. The money contributed by the Independent Arts Foundation will go towards paying the actors' fees, and will help us to present a new local independent work to a local, national and international audience."

AGM – NEW BOARD MEMBER

Nominations were sought for the one vacant position on the Board at the AGM held in August at the Public Schools Club. Three nominations were received and following the election process, Dr John Holmes was selected. Thank you to all the nominees for their interest in standing for the Board.



John has provided some background on his career in the Arts. The IAF is pleased to welcome John to the Board.

John's Arts background ranges across teaching in secondary schools, Advising and Consulting in Drama for the Education Department of SA, and being Drama Chief Examiner for what is now called SACE. He has also sat on, or chaired, the Boards of Adelaide-based theatre companies in SA, chaired country Arts Councils, Historical Societies and Theatre Groups. Arts colleagues speak of him as being "passionate, fair and hardworking".

His career continued in The Arts as he moved to the University sector where he lectured and became an Associate Professor and Head of School. Currently he supervises doctoral research students across the Arts of drama, visual art, dance, palliative care, religion, sexuality and race. He enjoys the challenge of doctoral students, and spends many hours a week with these candidates, doing so without remuneration as an Adjunct with UniSA.

John holds a B.A (Hons), Diploma of Education, Master of Arts (Aboriginal Studies) and a Doctorate of Education. His current writing ranges across the Arts, with drama being a major focus, plus writing biographies and work around disability. With colleagues he has recently researched a 70,000-word primary source material entitled "The history of Drama Education in South Australia".

Aside from an ongoing interest in the Arts, for many years John has been a Justice of the Peace for South Australia, and he is one of the longest serving and most popular Civil Celebrants for the Commonwealth. He also prepares the annual program for a large group of gardeners – The Hills Green Thumbs Garden Group! Recently he moved from a large Hills garden to a much smaller Glen Osmond patch which more easily accommodates extensive travel in Australia and overseas. With his partner Kym, John travels overseas each year to visit family who are now in Vienna, adding excursions either side, loves visiting the 'Outback', and tries to spend 'focussed' time with seven grandchildren.

After this year's particularly good end of year IAF event John said that he: "enjoys the Literary and Film Group gatherings, writes appalling poetry, loves a drink, and has a good time at all functions!"

VALE ALAN FARWELL (1944-2015)

Our members will be saddened to hear that longtime member and former very successful Chair of IAF, Alan Farwell passed away on September 12 after a long fight with cancer.

Alan began his working career as a teacher, but soon moved into music education and the arts. He was a founding member of "Come Out" children's arts festival, Superintendent of the South Australian Education Department's music division and Chairperson of the South Australian Chapter of the Australian Society for Music Education. He dedicated his working life to youth arts in South Australia.

Moving to Auburn in 2002, it did not take Alan very long to become immersed in the town.



Under his chairmanship of the Auburn Community Development Committee many notable improvements were made to the town. Alan was also involved in establishing the Open Garden Scheme at Auburn and a driver behind the CJ Dennis Festival.

His dedication to improving and developing his town was honoured with an Australia Day Citizen of the Year Award in January 2015.

Alan Farwell will be remembered for his efforts to reinvigorate Auburn as it entered the 21st Century, as well as his love of the arts, and work for young people.

REMARKABLE ACHIEVEMENTS

Jessica Dames AM

Jessica Dames AM, Founding Chair of IAF in 1991, has a remarkable record of supporting the Arts in South Australia. It was Jessica and husband Joe with others who decided that the work they were doing for the Elizabethan Theatre Trust should continue after the national organisation collapsed. It was Jessica's energy and vision that helped create IAF and later IAF Clare Branch. Jessica received national recognition for her outstanding achievements by

being awarded an AM, Member of the Order of Australia.

Her Clare Story:

In 2005 following her relocation to Burra, Jessica was appointed to the Clare Region Tourism Committee. In this role she became aware of the need, and the opportunities for, the Independent Arts Foundation to support and promote the artists in the region as a natural adjunct to tourism in the area.

As a consequence, in 2007 the IAF Clare Branch was formed, with Jessica Dames as Regional Chair. The projects that her committee has iimplemented since 2007 included:

- The IAF Clare Valley Movie Club established 2007. The Club has proved very popular with some people driving 100 to 150 km each month to see and discuss a movie and partake of good regional wine & food.
- SALA Festivals (South Australian Living Artists) in the region for 2008 and 2009.
 These involved 65 artists and 30 venues exhibiting art works in 2008 increasing to 120 artists at 60 venues in 2009.

These festivals once again demonstrated to Jessica the great influence art can have in uniting communities and providing a medium by which people of all ages can become involved. In 2009 Jessica was the winner of the Jim Barry Clare Valley Tourism Excellence Awards for "Outstanding Contribution by an Individual".
