IAF also supports masterclasses in the Cabaret Fringe for emerging performers. All this has contributed to Adelaide being recognised as the leader of the revival of the art of Cabaret.

NEIL CURNOW AWARD WINNER 2014



Kate Cheel, graduate and emerging South Australian actor, Adelaide College of the Arts (TAFESA) has been chosen as the winner of the 2014 Neil Curnow Award. Valued at \$10,000 the award will enable Kate to develop her arts practice at the Stella Adler Studio New York City through

study intensives in Shakespeare and Chekhov. In addition to her acting, Kate has undertaken learning secondments with My Darling Patricia (Sydney) and Daniel Schlusser Ensemble (Melbourne) to further develop her skills as a theatre-maker.

Since graduating from Adelaide College of the Arts in 2011, Kate has worked consistently in both theatre and film. While still in her final year of study, Kate made her professional debut with the State Theatre Company SA in Three Sisters.

Kate says..."As an early-career artist, I am continually re-negotiating my relationship and place within my art and determinedly seeking growth of my artistic practice, I feel it is important to my development that I explore, question and engage with multiple ideologies and practices so that I come closer to understanding and cultivating my own."

The Neil Curnow Award is made possible through the generous bequest of the late Neil Curnow and is facilitated by the Helpmann Academy on behalf of the Independent Arts Foundation. The award is open to final—year students and graduates who have studied theatre direction, theatre lighting, acting or voice at the Flinders Drama Centre and TAFE SA's College of the Arts.

CATE FOWLER AM

Congratulations to IAF Member Cate Fowler (pictured) who was awarded a Member of the Order of Australia in the recent Queen's Birthday Honours for her service to the performing arts, particularly in the areas of children's theatre and education.



Cate was youth and family program manager at the Adelaide Festival Centre in the 1980s-90s and artistic director of the 1995 Come Out Festival before moving to Brisbane.

where she ran the Out of the Box Festival and became director of education services for the Queensland Arts Council.

In 2001, Ms Fowler returned to Adelaide to set up Windmill Theatre, where she remained director until 2007. During her tenure Windmill won 15 arts awards, including three national Helpmann Awards for best children's presentation and best visual/physical theatre with its shows Twinkle Twinkle Little Fish and Riverland.

More recently, Ms Fowler has spent time working in Phnom Penh with residents of the Sunrise Children's Village orphanage, who performed their show Cambodia Sun Rising at the 2012 OzAsia Festival.

"When I first went to Cambodia I was just overwhelmed and thought, 'where do you start?' The only thing I believe in is arts and education, so that's what I offered. It just showed how extraordinary these children were."

Ms Fowler is currently developing early childhood bicultural arts programs for Aboriginal centres in the Port Hedland region of WA.

I want to say a very big thank-you to the IAF for your support in assisting me with a \$1000 grant to attend the May 2015 Professional Actors Masterclass conducted by the Australian Institute for Performing Arts (AIPA) at their Los Angeles headquarters. AIPA has been training students

from Australia and around the world in their Hollywood studios since 2002.

My trip to attend the Professional Actors
Masterclass was a whirlwind experience that blew
me off my feet from start to finish. From finding
out only four weeks before the course started that
I had been recommended for acceptance, to
making the decision to take up their offer despite
very little money to support myself while in the
US, and then to meeting with the IAF whose Chair
and Board agreed to give me their wonderful
funding grant which set me on my way! I was
then able to immerse myself in Los Angeles
culture and to dive into the course that pushed me
beyond my limits as an actor working with industry
professionals and top casting directors —
Hollywood's royalty — it was all just amazing.

The course was a truly intensive Masterclass. spread over five weeks without breaks. The aim of the course is to strengthen the "bookability" and skill level of actors who are serious about their craft, who see acting as a realistic vocational choice and who wish to improve their performance and audition techniques. I learnt so much about the industry and how much bigger it was than our small one here in Adelaide. To put our industry in perspective: Adelaide has one or two main casting directors, Melbourne has around four, Sydney has about six and every other state/territory has just one. In Canada there are approximately 20 casting directors, in New York there are over 50 casting directors and in Hollywood there are over 400!!

Our classes were mainly held at the famous Woman's Club of Hollywood in the back at the old school house where Charlie Chaplin used to rehearse in his glory days. During my five-weeks I had to get use to speaking in an American Midwest accent every day and night to perfect an unmistakable American accent by showcase at

the end of the course. That alone was very difficult for me since I realised that, as a first generation Australian Vietnamese with a strong Australian accent in which I had subconsciously trained myself, taking on an American accent was very confusing for my brain. I guess I had never really thought I'd ever work anywhere else than in the Australian industry. That is, until recently. But this had all changed since I was in America attending the Masterclass.

The course pushed me in ways that I have never been pushed before. We worked some 14-16 hours a day, including memorising different scripts every night. We learned how to be successful as an actor in Hollywood, how to apply for an entertainment visa, how to self-tape one's own auditions from anywhere in the world, and what is the top standard required when auditioning from our home country. I learnt so many things that Adelaide could never have shown me and what I've taken from this course is a new revitalisation in working on my craft as an actor.

The quality of the casting directors we got to work with were of the highest calibre: included in their number were casting directors for films such as When Harry Met Sally, A Beautiful Mind and Xmen and the TV series Glee and, Breaking Bad. This course showed me how these top-tier casting agents work in their casting rooms day- today and they gave me an understanding of the many factors that go into a casting session. For example, they explained that it is not important as an actor to just "get the gig", but to do the best audition possible, with bold choices, while trying to be memorable at the same time. They said that even if an actor is not the specific type required for the part, in the end they may remember you for another production in future. Something I will most certainly remember.

So, thanks again IAF. Your support is truly appreciated. You certainly helped me on my journey as an actor from Adelaide.

This field research will allow François to explore Renaissance paintings in person, as well as immerse himself in Italian contemporary art.

The June S. Tanner Memorial Scholarship is offered by Carclew in conjunction with the Independent Arts Foundation and the Italia-Australia Association.

This once-off June S. Tanner Memorial Scholarship supports a South Australian artist (aged 26 or under) working in any art form to further develop their practice through a professional development program (of choice) in Italy. The scholarship is offered to the value of \$4,000.

The June S. Tanner Memorial Scholarship was established to honour the memory of a late Vice-President of the SA Branch of the Italia-Australia Association June Tanner, who accompanied groups of Australians on cultural tours of Italy and also taught mosaic-making.


