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Chair's Report – John Holmes

Board visit to the Mid North Branch, 30 October, 2019. This was my 3rd visit as Chair, and I know, with such a large number of Board Members joining me for the second year, we made a most positive link with our Branch.

Jen Dunstan attended, with *Mary Odlum* and her husband Keith, *Helen Onopko, David McClay* and Heather, *myself* and Kym Smith. Jill Argent also joined us and that was hugely appreciated by us all. A total of 9 stayed at the Blyth Hotel, joined the Branch for drinks, saw the film 'Amazing Grace', and dined in the Institute to a beautiful meal prepared by the all-male Lions Club!

The Mid North Branch has decided to secede from the IAF and revert to a Film Club to support the Blyth Cinema and local artists.

The following is a transcript of my speech to the Mid North Branch:

"In my letter to all IAF Members in July of this year I noted that: "The Mid-North Branch has increased its profits and is committed to working closely with the Foundation. The Board was unanimous in its acknowledgement of the outstanding work that Sally Michael and her team are doing with their Members, the Blyth cinema, the local community and for emerging artists across South Australia.

And, again, in my Annual Report I said that: "The Branch works hard for its members and is regularly contributing towards the extensions and refurbishments of the Blyth Cinema with over \$2000 being transferred this year. The Branch is again a strong financial contributor towards IAF grants to emerging artists and is actively seeking new applicants from the area. Thank you sincerely to all Mid North members."

It is now October 2019 and you have been making plans for your future. I understand that you have decided in 2020 and onwards to focus on your primary activity as a Film Club, based in Blyth, to support your cinema and to support local artists.

I fully understand and support your decision. I want to thank you, again, for the outstanding support you have given to our statewide Foundation, and hence to emerging artists across South Australia.

Should you, individually, also wish to remain with the Foundation of course you will be warmly welcomed.

May I thank your Member, Chris Cocks, for his regular assessment of applicants for the 2 rounds of grants each year. Chris is speedily thorough! Especially, I acknowledge your founding Chair, Jessica Dames, and your current one, Sally Michael.



Sally, you have worked tirelessly with your friends to enhance and expand the Branch, and as you head towards retirement from the position, the entire Board unanimously thanks you! And, we would like to present you with a token of our appreciation."

Treasurer's Report – Mary Odlum

In November, IAF Awarded two Small Grant Awards of \$1000 each to

- Josh Moloney of Tutti Arts to support an exhibition at Fisher Jeffries during the Fringe 2020
- Bay the Artist (Ashton Boyd), Artist in Residence at Nexus Arts from 6 February to 13 March 2020

IAF also honoured our ongoing commitment to the Critics Circle Innovation Award (\$1000) which in 2019 went to the Patch Theatre.

IAF contributed \$956.18 to the future renovations of the Blyth Cinema. This amount being 50% of the profits made between July and December 2019. This will be the last contribution IAF will make as the Mid North Film Club has decided not to be linked to IAF going forward, preferring to support their local community with all funds raised. We wish them all the very best for the future.

The Neil Curnow Award \$10,000 facilitated by the Helpmann Academy on behalf of the IAF was awarded to emerging actor and theatre maker, Lachlan Barnett, who graduated from Flinders University in 2016. The Neil Curnow Award is made possible through the generous bequest of the late Neil Curnow.

Following a very successful film fundraising event to help raise funds to complete Madeleine Blackwell's film DAMAGE, IAF was able to give \$1500 towards the project and look forward to seeing the complete version of DAMAGE in 2020. The almost complete version was pretty good!

For the first time, IAF launched a Small Grants Christmas Fundraiser to which members could make tax deductible donations through Trybooking. The idea was that the donation would be a gift to the person who had everything! \$643.49 was raised which is well over half the cost of a small grant. Thank you to all who donated!

IAF Small Grant recipient review Jasmine Crisp



During March to August 2019 I travelled to the UK, Iceland, The Faroe Islands and Finland to participate in three artist residencies (Iceland, Finland) and to visit sites of ancestral history and artistic research/career interest. Artwork made and inspired by this project was then displayed in my debut solo show at Floating Goose Studios in Adelaide for November 2019.

[Joe's Grand Tour]

It was thanks to the support of the IAF Small Grant program that I was able to participate in the SíM (Assoc

of Icelandic Visual Artists), Seljavegur residency in Reykjavik, Iceland for the month of April 2019. On the first evening of our arrival, all of the resident artists gathered at the communal balcony to watch the northern lights dance above the Reykjavik harbor. I knew from the beginning that this experience was going to be irreplaceable. The SíM residency was my first ever international residency experience and instantly introduced me to entire new ways or working in, connecting with, and understanding the arts. SíM offered me the opportunity to give my first international artist talk and first international exhibition experience. The SíM program also helped introduce me to local Icelandic artists who helped to direct my research and my understanding of the Icelandic condition. During this residency I lived and worked alongside 12 other international artists in a setting that encouraged sharing, collaboration and mentorship. These artists helped me understand how to pursue careers in the arts across different mediums, locations and institutions. During our stay I was able to assist artist Mar Gurrero with film shooting in the Icelandic



countryside, feature as a model in the work of French photographic artist Isabella Hin and participate in a photographic tour with adventure photographer Joe Shutter (who I later incorporated into a painting I made during my residency). I have formed ongoing relationships with many artists from this residency program whom I have already reconnected with in Helsinki and Melbourne.

[Birthday in Reykjavik]

As inspired by the nearby old harbor and tourist sites outside

the SíM residency I produced 'Venus is a Tourist (self-portrait in Reykjavik) (pictured right) which was featured in Adelaide Review December artist profile and was more recently awarded as the winner of the 10th Prospect Portrait Prize. Two other paintings produced and designed during this time featured in my first solo show HOME X HABITAT at Floating Goose Studios and will be further exhibited at Adelaide Airport in January 2020. This international journey and exhibition outcome were invaluable life and career opportunities, which has had significant impact on my emerging career. As an Adelaide born and based



artist, a recent Adelaide Central School of Art graduate and having completed my first residency experience with Carclew, this grant helped me to expand my horizons at a crucial time in my career development.

Olivia Kathigitis

With the support of the Independent Arts Foundation, I was able to build up and strengthen a home workshop and studio for my Visual Art professional practice.

This encouragement has allowed me to verify the sustainability of my creative portals - feeding the South Australian Visual Arts and the Australian 'artistic economy'.

The IAF and the Small Grant for Emerging Arts has allowed the fruition of many ideas once held captive to the limitations of my home studio. Having the resources available give any artist a clearer span of their creative practice; broadening the field of experimentation and opens opportunities. I now have a hot bay for welding, soldering and annealing, power and hand-tools, OH&S standard safety requirements & a range of materials for my visual practice. I now stand with the confidence in my home studio and workplace. Creative crossovers and collaborations have already started; my jewellery and visual arts practice are diversifying, broadening their reach and allowing for new concepts and ideas to be brought to the table.

The allocated funds went to purchasing:

- Ozito 2000W Heatgun (new)
- Dremel 3000 Drill & Kit (secondhand)
- Oxy flex nosel, shaft & regulator (second-hand)
- Fire Bricks
- Fire Extinguisher
- Sewing Machine (second-hand)
- Materials (base metals, textiles, wood etc)
- Cold working tools (new files, sandpapers, wire brushes and finishing tools)



• Hot working accessories (flux, cold pickle, solder wire)

Through creative portals, I was able to source reliable tools and fixtures either new or second-hand. I have a great appreciation for the South Australian arts community and their willingness to support their peers.

Since receiving the IAF Small Grant not only have I built up my workshop and studio, but participated in a self-directed research project in the Atacama Desert, Chile working with the Kunza community, broadened the reach of my jewellery business internationally, and continued exploration and experimentation within my visual art practice; including markets, workshops, exhibition proposals and creative collaborations. This coming year is lined with great opportunities that I am excited to venture through and push the trajectory of my practice further. The newly developed workshop will now fully allow me to digest, review and foster creative ideas generated from my professional experiences.

It is a powerful thing to have funding bodies like the IAF present and assisting the emerging arts and artists. By supporting people early in their career, awarded funding like this can push and sustain the confidence in one's practice. This encouragement radiates through one's career, and contributes to the conversation of the Australian Independent and Emerging Arts.

For the month of October last year, a special solo exhibition was displayed at Urban Cow Studio in Adelaide. I am a glass blower working out of Jam Factory whose debut show was titled 'EYG' to represent my growing career as 'Emma Young Glass.'

Achieved with financial support from the Independent Arts Foundation, I filled the gallery with artwork that represented my developing glass practice,





also including handmade prints and a mini-doco film.

In particular, the IAF funding was used to develop a new body of work inspired by my recent travels to my grandparents' birth-country of Malta. I experimented with new greens and browns purchased from a recently opened SA supplier of glass colour, Kugler Australia.

The resulting 'Prickly Pear' and 'Stone Wall' glass installation resonated with audiences, regardless of their background.



'EYG' included iterations of my early career glass sculptures, 'Frog Cake Keepsakes' and 'FruChoc Bowls,' plus popular products which sell in stockists nation-wide: 'Aussie Front Yard Flora Vases' and 'Penny Pinchers.' I developed new pieces for my 'Watermelon' series, inspired by

memories of eating the summer fruit at family barbecues over the years, including the wildly popular 'Solid Watermelon Slice' which made for a stunning poster piece. Many photos have been shared across my social media, @emmayoungglass.

Vale Franz Kempf AM FRSA (1926-2020)

Franz was an artist, craftsman and teacher whose paintings and prints are



housed in many public collections around the world, such as the Victoria and Albert Museum, London, the Australian National Gallery the

National Gallery of Victoria, and the Art Gallery of South Australia, as well as in many private collections. Anyone who attended the opening of any of his exhibitions in Adelaide would have seen how quickly the 'sold" stickers appeared on his works of art! As a Life Member of the IAF and an enthusiastic supporter of nurturing young and emerging talent, Franz funded the establishment of the IAF Franz Kempf Printmaker Award, worth \$4,000, which was administered by Carclew and awarded four times. After a full and rich life, Franz passed away on 8 February. The Chair and Board of the IAF join with members in sending our condolences to his wife Tamar and their family.

June S Tanner Award – Olivia Bozzon

In September 2019 I undertook both Italian and piano lessons for one week in



Florence at the Scuola di Leonardo da Vinci in partnership with II Trillo Scuola di Musica. During my week in Florence I attended intensive small group Italian classes in the morning followed by two hour one on one piano lessons. My piano teacher Matteo Dentellato was supportive and allowed me to use the practice rooms at any time of the day, I would often arrive half an hour to an hour early for my lessons which allowed me to practice the pieces I had learnt. We focused on sight reading and improvisation and introduced new repertoire each lesson from different genres. I thoroughly enjoyed my piano

lessons with Matteo and learnt a lot in each lesson. I feel proud at how much I accomplished in the lessons with Matteo and have a new found confidence with sight reading and improvisation.

My Italian lessons at Scuola di Leonardo da Vinci were all taught in Italian by teacher Monica Gentili. Monica showed great enthusiasm for teaching and encouraged all students in our class to feel confident speaking, writing and reading in Italian. At the end of the week I completed a test and passed. I made several friends from the school and would often have lunch with my peers in between Italian and piano lessons and a dinner by the duomo on my last night with my closest friend from my class. I keep in contact with my friends through facebook as we all parted ways home to countries such as France, Germany, Switzerland, United Kingdom and Australia.

During my piano lessons with Matteo I felt incredibly accomplished as I learnt several pieces of music in a short period of time.



As I previously have not learnt how to sufficiently sightread music, I was amazed at my results with Matteo as he guided me and supported me during the course of my lessons. Together we also worked on improvisation where we would duet on the piano and I would improvise over his bass lines. I have previously done this in the past during my studies in Adelaide however Matteo's approach made the task easier and enjoyable, and he also suggested I attend the Firenze

Jazz Festival that was taking place whilst I was in Florence.

My Italian lessons were challenging but extremely rewarding as I had been thrown in the deep end with all the lessons taught solely in Italian. My teacher Monica encouraged me to speak more Italian as she could see that I was able to understand the language but lacked speaking skills. I had the opportunity to read, write and speak in Italian and



converse in conversations with my class mates in Italian. I amazed myself at how well I was able to understand the content of the lessons which later helped me during my travels when I visited my family. This made my experience so much more rewarding as I was able to understand and speak with my relatives. I am proud of all that I achieved during my time in Florence as well as other parts of my trip. I continued to immerse myself in the culture of each city and was fortune enough to surround myself with amazing art, music, food, fashion, history and more.

Neil Curnow Award - Lachlan Barnett

The Chair of the IAF, Dr John Holmes, presented Lachlan Barnett with the \$10,000 Neil Curnow Award at the October Literary Club held at the packed Havelock Hotel function room. The Helpmann Academy administers this prestigious Award.

"Lachlan is an emerging actor and theatre maker, who graduated from Flinders University in 2016. He will receive up to \$10,000 towards a professional development program of his design.

Established in 2005 and made possible through the generous bequest of the late Neil Curnow (passionate actor, director and teacher), The Neil Curnow

Award supports emerging artist to undertake further study or an internship at a recognised institution.

Lachlan will be using the award to travel to the UK in January 2020 to undergo a full-time puppetry course with Curious School of Puppetry (CSP) in Falmouth, Cornwall. The six-week course will help Lachlan develop a physical understanding of puppetry technique, craft and design with the outcome of diversifying his practice as a performer and theatre maker. Lachlan aims to use his experience at CSP to create his own original character and program to be used to tell stories and facilitate discussion about and for primary school aged children.


